

Level 4 Senior Housing & Property Manager

Senior Housing and Property Management professionals work across both the social and private housing sectors, managing and delivering a range of housing and property-related services.

The role involves managing teams, budgets and resources with delegated authority to achieve business objectives and maintain high-quality services. All work must comply with contractual obligations, organisational policies, statutory requirements and housing legislation. Senior Housing and Property Managers oversee specific functions while working closely with tenants, residents, colleagues, communities and external partners to improve services, resolve complex issues and support safe, sustainable communities.

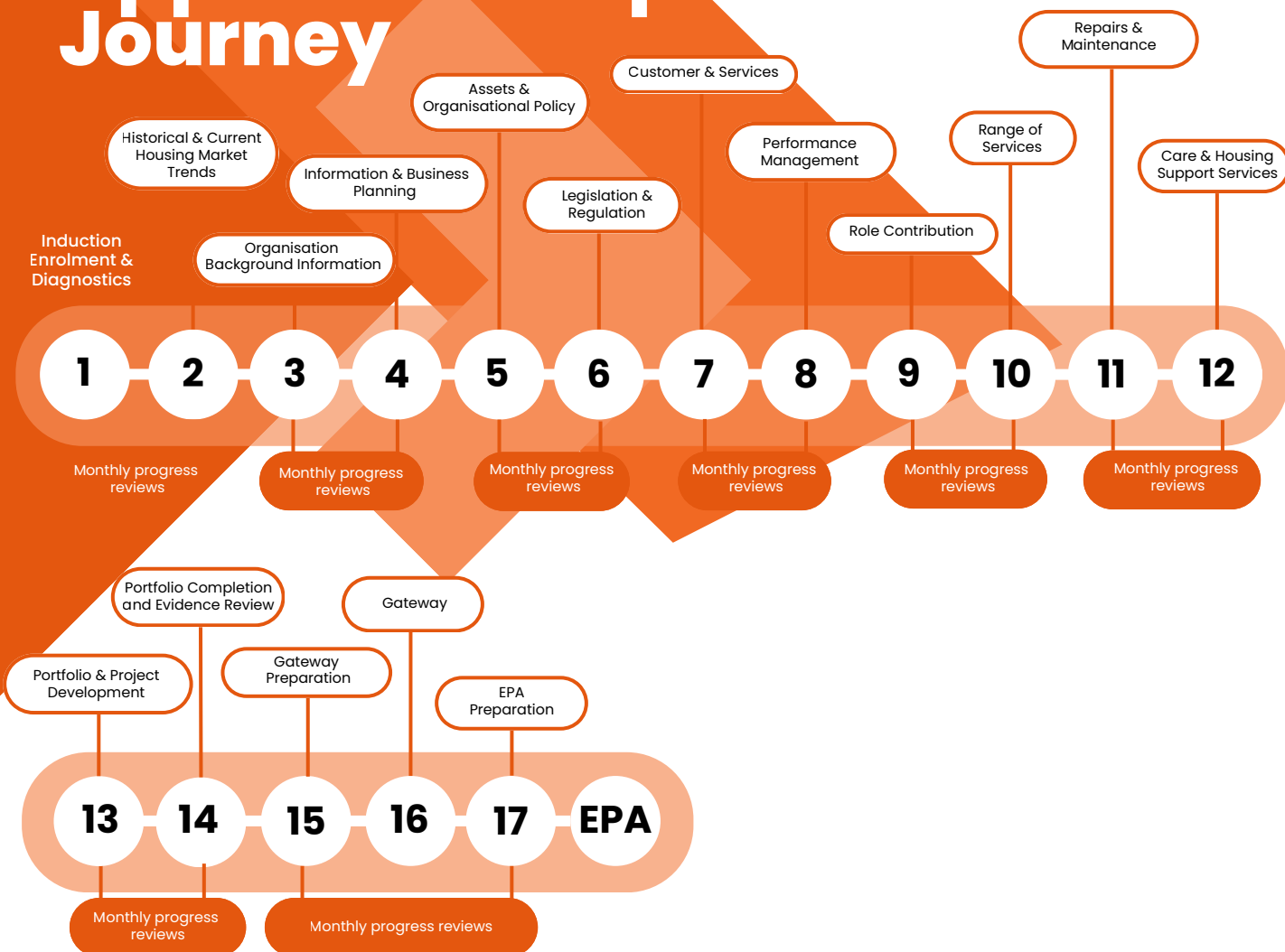
Work-Based Project

Professional Discussion (Interview/Viva)

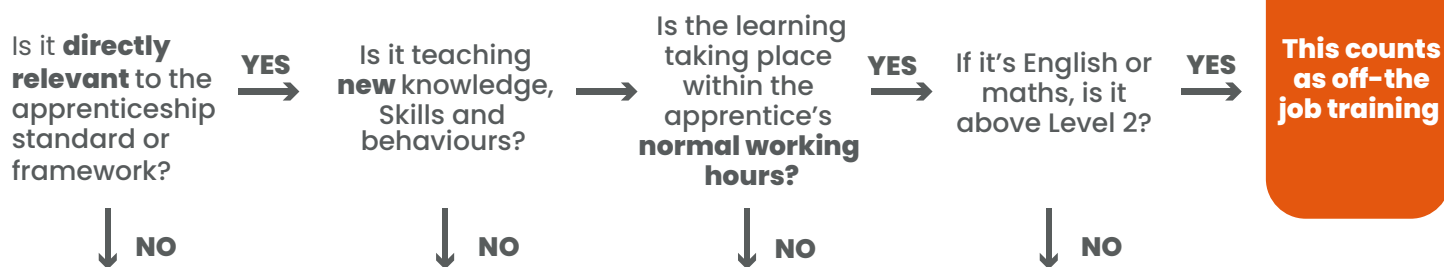
Take part in a structured professional discussion with an independent assessor, using your portfolio and work-based project to demonstrate your competence against the apprenticeship standard
